A Message from Ms Comfort

Bikeability

A number of our Year 6 children undertook Bikeability training this week. These sessions involved riding their bicycles safely around the playground and showing accuracy in steering, turning and using the correct arm signals. Children were then taken out of school on their bicycles and given the opportunity to learn how to ride safely along the road; taking into consideration their road positioning and being aware of their surroundings. As well as this, the children were taught how to use junctions correctly. This means that our year 6 children are now confident in using the roads to enable them to cycle to their secondary schools safely.

Meet the new teacher

Most classes moved up to meet with their new teacher this week. This is an important part of our transition work in preparing children for where they will be next year and who they will be with. Reception class will be meeting Mrs Hannah Austin next week.

Contact with school staff

Unfortunately we have had a few incidences recently of parents being verbally aggressive and rude to school staff, either face to face at the school gate or on the telephone.

I would like to remind all parent/carers that they are as responsible for upholding our school Christian Values as the staff and the children are. There may well be times when you feel concerned about something to do with school; we understand that and will always work promptly to address worries or complaints. I ask that you are all mindful of the way you speak to staff and the words you use — most particularly in front of your children, or other people's children as they are coming to and from school. I thank those parents who do always conduct themselves in an acceptable way.

Absence during term time

We have seen an increase in absence from school at the moment. Children must only be absent from school if they are too unwell to attend. If your child is absent – for whatever reason - then you must telephone the school office to explain why they are. If we have not been informed where your child is and why they are absent we have to report to the Local Authority that your child is missing.

There is an improvement in children arriving to school on time – thank you. If your child is late they must be brought into the school building at Laureston Place by their parent so that you can hand them safely over to the office staff.

Coronavirus Symptoms

On Tuesday 29 March, the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, Sajid Javid, set out the next steps for living with COVID-19 in England from Friday, 1 April.

Updated guidance

Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend. Children and young people with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days, which is when they are most infectious.

Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature. Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious.
