Special Educational Needs (SEND) Provision at St Mary's CEP

Lisa McDonald who works for Kent Local Authority as a Specialist SENd Advisor, visited St Mary's CEP last Friday. She met with our SENCo, Claudia Marsh, and me. We talked about how we are working to meet the needs of all of the children at St Mary's and took Lisa on a tour to spend time in all classes. It was a very positive visit and I wanted to share with you all some of the highlights from her report:-

- There was a great sense of inclusion across the classrooms and all children were engaged in their learning
- The school is welcoming and the teachers & TAS were working in evident collaboration.
- Teachers are clearly committed to the classroom environment and have created some great learning opportunities.
- Children were proud of their work and happy to talk about what they were learning.
- There was a range of adapted activities taking place to allow all children to access learning regardless of their stage of development
- It was evident that the teaching team have a commitment to the school's inclusion development

We are working to develop our use of Information Technology to support our learners. Some of your children may be using Clicker on the laptop to help to support with writing activities, perhaps they can tell you about this? We are planning more staff training on this program and also looking to introduce another program which will help us to standardise images and words across all classes which we will use for labels and visual timetables – this will help all of our children to develop their early language skills.

Reading

Helping your child to become a good reader and to develop a love of reading is one of the most important jobs of being a parent. Good reading skills will help your child in all stages of their education and adult life.



Mrs Wallis ran another home reading session for our Reception and Key Stage 1 parents this week – thank you to those who came. Look out for the next date if you have not yet been, or want to come again. We are aiming for all families to attend at least one of the sessions so look forward to seeing you soon if we have not yet.

Governors met this week and shared what they had seen at school during recent visits to classes during reading and phonics lessons. Melissa Carter enjoyed joining Class 5 for their lesson on Beowulf and then Class 2 for their group reading session whilst Trish Simmons had a good time in Class 1 observing children learning about how to use their voice to show expression and emotion when reading aloud.

NSPCC Number Day

What a fun-filled 'mega maths' day; from 'human calculators to 'Numicon necklaces', the children looked brilliant as they 'dressed up for digits'. The School Council led an informative Collective Worship this morning outlining the importance of the NSPCC and raising money for the charity. The children were engrossed in problem-solving and investigative activities in their Maths learning.

The families of St Mary's CEP have raised £91.00 for NSPCC - I thank you all for your kind donations.

Parent Governor

We did not receive any volunteers or nominations for our parent governor vacancy when we advertised recently so we will be trying again!

The paperwork we have to send out for this role is rather formal and can appear quite off-putting, please don't be put off by this! In a nutshell, school governors work with the leaders of the school to help run the school, this includes making decision about how to spend the budget, assisting with recruitment of staff, reviewing pupil outcomes and planning for continued school improvement.

There is lots of free training available to help governors to understand their role. Our governors are a really friendly bunch and always very welcoming to anyone who joins. Meetings are held six times a year – one per term, currently these are on Wednesdays starting at 4.3opm for about two hours.

Governors also spend time in school visiting classes and speaking to staff so that they can see the outcome of decisions made.



Coronavirus Symptoms

On Tuesday 29 March, the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, Sajid Javid, set out the next steps for living with COVID-19 in England from Friday, 1 April.

Updated guidance

Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend. Children and young people with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days, which is when they are most infectious.

Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature. Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious.
